The Mandate: NEW focuses on the immediate needs of immigrant women by directing them to settlement resources and providing them with language instruction, pathways and coaching towards employment opportunities as well as programs that help them overcome the systems and structures that impede their success. NEW also provides pathways to employment, training, coaching and programs to disadvantaged youth and to a lesser extent, men.



How NFW Teams see their mission:

The Newcomer Settlement Program (NSP) seeks to support the successful settlement and integration of newcomers, including immigrants and refugees, through the provision of early settlement and longer-term integration support.

The goal of NEW's English Language Program (ELP) is ultimately 'self-actualization.' We take a holistic approach that not only provides language training but life skills coaching - from how to advocate for your family to societal norms around parenting to building confidence to seek employment, ask questions about finances and taxes and groom contributing citizens

We are creating safe space with smaller class size to build a collective of strong women.

The Employment Team recognizes that individuals are part of a larger, complex system that may contain visible and invisble barriers and customizes its approach by building trust, knowledge, skill and strategic community connections through wrap-around case management delivered by staff with lived experience.

The SEW IT program targets women on Ontario Works inspiring them to seek jobs, higher education, start a business or seek help overcoming obstacles - by drawing them into our customized wrap-around case management approach.

Our Community Services Partnerships program ("Newcomer Women's Network") facilitates access to resources that improve social outcomes for vulnerable, marginalized and high-risk communities.
